We are the Co-Chairs of the Prosperity Council Task Force on Creative Dimensions in Prosperity. We hosted a forum for the community last spring at the King Street Theatre Centre to begin an important dialogue. We have spent the past year engaged in research and planning to move the creative agenda forward. We are now working towards engaging the business sector in a forum in September and are asking you to help us create input for the forum and some portions of the agenda.

Our intent on August 28 is to bring you up to speed on our work, what we have learned and more importantly what we are planning. After giving you a chance to ask us questions and dialogue with colleagues on the answers, we plan to break into smaller groups to discuss several key questions. The work from these groups will be transcribed and summarized for use by the forum in September.

For your information, appended is the text we have sent to business leaders to ask them to hold the September date in their calendars. You will see that we have approached them from the perspective on creativity that is most meaningful to them.
